

Established in 2015 with support from the Marion County Public Health Department, the Marion County Youth Violence Prevention Coalition represents nearly 60 organizations<sup>i</sup> with a shared interest in preventing youth violence in Indianapolis, IN. Today, the Coalition remains focused on its mission to "convene community stakeholders, conduct research, provide leadership, and empower people to create opportunities that build more peaceful homes, schools, neighborhoods, and workplaces."

In the years since the Coalition was established, violent crime in Indianapolis has increased at such an alarming rate that the Marion County City-County Council formally declared gun violence and violent crime as public health dangers in 2018. At the same time, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention has continued to demonstrate the adverse impact that exposure to violence has on a young person's lifelong health and wellbeing – an effect that can lead to a generational cycle of violence, trauma, and poor health outcomes. In 2020, the consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic and the public movement to address systemic racial inequities have further exposed the realities of this crisis and its impact on our city's youth.

With these increasingly high stakes at the forefront, a reenergized Coalition prioritized the development of a focused strategic plan to guide the collective efforts of its members to prevent youth violence in Indianapolis. Under the leadership of the Coalition's steering committee<sup>ii</sup>, and with planning facilitation from Taylor Advising, the Coalition's membership engaged in an inclusive, solution-focused planning process in 2020, anchored by the public health model of youth violence prevention, the expertise of community stakeholders<sup>iii</sup>, and the momentum of city-wide violence reduction priorities. The following plan is the result of this collaborative effort.
